Let's Keep INVASIVE PLANTS OUT!

As part of the healing process after the fires we are all very keen to start planting and reestablishing our gardens. Our bushland has been decimated, our whole environment is extremely fragile and very prone to weed infestation. In the past, some of the plants chosen for gardens have had a severe impact on our natural environment. Over time species such as Holly, Sycamore Maple, Portugal Laurel Cherry Laurel, Pittosporum, Cotoneaster, English Broom and English Ivy became invaders of our bushland. Unfortunately, some of these and other invasive plants are still readily available in nurseries.

As a result of the fires, we have a golden opportunity to address the problem of invasive plants.

Please consider carefully the plants that you may choose to become part of your new garden. By avoiding plants with invasive habits either by winged seeds like Sycamore Maple and Box Elder, berries like Portugal Laurel and Pittosporum or plants that are prone to suckering such as Poplars and Robinias, we can protect our natural environment for the future. There are numerous varieties of beautiful ornamental and native trees and shrubs which do not have an adverse affect on our natural environment.

Indigenous plants can make great alternatives and some very beautiful species are available such as Balm Mint Bush, Victorian Christmas Bush, Mountain Pepper and the Myrtle Beech which makes a great alternative to Pittosporum.

As part of the restoration of the Stevenson River, a list of indigenous plants was put together by Melissa Bunning who tragically died in the fires of Black Saturday. We thank Melissa for her valuable contribution.
